



## Notice to Voters Election Changes Implemented

With the passing of House Bill 458 the Board of Elections would like to inform voters of the changes that will be in effect for the May 2, 2023 Special Election. When planning to vote please consider the following changes:

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### Early In-Person Voting

#### Identification

- Voters must show a government issued ID such as driver’s license, state ID card, Military ID or US passport. The ID must have the voters name and photograph and not be expired.

#### Hours

- Hours for Early Voting at the Board of Elections office no longer include the Monday before the election. Those hours have been spread out along the last week of early voting. Early in-person voting hours for the May 2, 2023 Special Election are as follows:

April 4 – April 7	8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. (Tuesday through Friday)
April 10 – April 14	8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. (Monday through Friday)
April 17 – April 21	8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. (Monday through Friday)
April 24 - April 30	7:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. on Monday 7:30 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. on Tuesday 7:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday through Friday 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on Saturday 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Sunday

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### Voting By Mail

- Identification when voting by mail consist of either a driver’s license number, state ID number, last four digits of voters social security number, or a copy (front & back) of voters unexpired photo ID.
- Voters must use the form provided by the Ohio Secretary of State when requesting an absentee ballot. If you would like an application to request an absentee ballot please [Click Here](#).
- The deadline for requesting an absentee ballot will now be the Tuesday (7 days) before each election.
- Voters who need to “cure” their ballot – correcting information on their absentee ballot – will have until the Saturday (4 days) after Election Day to do so.
- The deadline for absentee ballots to arrive at the Board of Elections is now the fourth day after Election Day as long as it is postmarked prior to Election Day.

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### Election Day Voting

- Voters must show a government issued ID such as driver’s license, state ID card, Military ID or a US passport that has not expired. Voters without a photo ID on Election Day will be required to cast a provisional ballot and will have up to four days after Election Day to bring your identification to the Board of Elections Office. If a voter has a religious objection to being photographed, they may complete an affidavit of religious objection.

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### Voter Registration

- When registering to vote or updating your voter registration voters must provide either the last four digits of their SSN, Ohio driver’s license, or state ID number. Voters are no longer able to use a copy of a photo ID, a military ID, or any of the formerly valid types of voter ID such as a utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government documents.
